
July 6 – **Bayard Rustin: The Man Behind The Dream** Blockbuster Concert, featuring singers from many of the commissioning choruses, including The Quire.

Welcome to the story of Bayard Rustin, a man who should be a familiar name to all of us, yet whose influence remains lost to many of the history books even being written today. We are truly honored that you are joining us to hear and learn about this foundational figure of the Civil Rights Movement — a figure who inspired us to sing his praises in 2018 and moved our group so deeply that we knew revisiting his story was the right thing to do this year. The sharing of this story brings together multiple facets of The Quire's mission — education, building community, choral excellence, and seeking justice.

The Quire was honored to be part of the commissioning of this work, which was made possible from a generous gift from Bruce & Mary Harreld, and we remain committed to the sharing of Bayard's story until his name is as familiar as the many prominent figures we see in other movements of justice, (e.g. Harvey Milk, Marsha P. Johnson, Laverne Cox, or George Takei).

DIRECTOR'S NOTE

What a privilege to present this work to local audiences again this season. Bayard Rustin is often called by historians the "invisible man" and "unknown hero" of the civil rights movement. Why?

Bayard Rustin was born in 1912 and raised in rural Pennsylvania by his grandmother, Julia, who was a devout Quaker. Bayard shared her Quaker faith and believed in non-violent activism, which became a familiar part of Dr. King's public activism. Bayard was a singer, athlete, organizer, and activist who single-handedly organized the march on Washington where the world heard Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. give his "I Have a Dream" speech — and, Bayard was an openly gay black man. That final piece, his sexuality, is the sad answer to why his name remains often lost in the history books.

But Bayard's own words say it best; shortly before his death in 1987, Bayard stated: "Twenty-five, thirty years ago, the barometer of human rights in the United States were black people. That is no longer true. The barometer for judging the character of people in regard to human rights is now those who consider themselves gay, homosexual, lesbian." He goes on to say: "We are all one. And if we don't know it, we will learn it the hard way."

It is our pleasure to present to you, Bayard Rustin, The Man Behind the Dream. The music is amazing, the text is revealing and enlightening. History is exposed. "We are all one."

"The idea of writing this work has been in my head for quite some time now. Bayard Rustin's role in the civil rights movement has largely been ignored in history due to the fact that it exposes some truths in America's past that many people would rather ignore or keep hidden. The election of Barack Obama as the United States' first black president in 2008 and the advances of LGBTA rights in America have brought these truths to the foreground. They cannot be ignored anymore. It is my hope that this work



sheds some light on a man who helped shape the civil rights movement and show that there are ways to advance a just cause without violence. Thank you, Jane [Ramseyer-Miller] for helping me make this a reality."
